

Rusty Russ brought home First Place with this shot off his own balcony.





Editorial...

As the newsletter's editor, I am free to write an "editorial". Sometimes it's even fun.



Barb Johns has been the secretary/treasurer of Foothills Photography Group for a very long time. But she's going to retire from that position on December 31, 2023. And we need someone to take over that job.

This would be the place where I heap praise on Barb and the selfless job she has done. But I'm not going to do

that. (Maybe in the November 2023 newsletter.)

Instead, I'm going to mount the old soapbox of appealing to members to help out.

This is the point where you might stop reading. Please don't.

As I write this, the Board has three unfilled openings: Director for Mentoring, Vice-president, and (now) Secretary/Treasurer. None of these openings requires long experience, formal training, or skills beyond what each of us has. A new incumbent can be up to speed in hours.

Presumedly, members become members based on a desire to learn more about photography, to mingle with like minded people, and to benefit from the energy and knowledge of others. With that in mind, I submit that you aren't getting your money's worth if you are just a listener. And the rest of us aren't getting the benefit of your contributions either.

So...what about the open jobs? At the top of the next page, I've shown a mini job description of each open slot.

What isn't there is mention of the board meetings. One week after each regular club meeting, the board gathers at a local restaurant for dinner and to conduct the business of the club. Each of the directors gives a status of his/her area; for example, programs, bank balance, field trip ideas, community service ideas, etc.. The meetings are really a sort of "round table" discussion rather than being highly structured and last (typically) less than one hour.

Let's look at the needs.

Director Mentoring	Program doesn't exist. Develop a procedure from the ground up that brings together the mentors and mentees.
Vice-President	Conduct the meeting when the president is absent. Attend board meetings and shadow the president for several years. Assume the presidency down the line?
Secretary/Treasurer	The most demanding of the three. Manage the membership list, make expenditures and deposits, track attendance, and draft board meeting minutes.
