


Here's a short summary of the subject taken from the Adorama web site.

“There are many different emotions that can be depicted in an image. In all our photographs, we strive to highlight joy, happiness, sorrow, despair, and love. However, the interpretation can differ depending on the viewer. The challenge in capturing an emotion, however, is in making it appear genuine.”

And these are the tips that the Adorama writer lists:

- Capture your subject in a familiar environment.
- Give minimum direction and do not intervene.
- Give your subject something to do.
- Learn to anticipate important moments.
- Focus on the eyes.
- Keep on shooting.
- Zoom in on other details.
- Use the element of surprise.



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
### UPCOMING PROGRAMS...

The Faroes are actually mountain tops in the North Atlantic approximately halfway between Norway and Iceland. The islands have only recently become destinations for photographers interested in the dramatic seascapes and rugged landscapes. This program was only partially made originally due to some technical difficulties at the November meeting.

A lot of Daniel's FPG work for the club was behind the scenes. For example, he instituted the popular Member Showcase competition, and he started a "First Tuesday" group in which – with those interested – he offered critiques and suggestions for image improvements. He hosted the monthly club meetings and chaired the monthly board meetings – in which he nudged members toward those elements that furthered the progress of the club. Every month he compiled a listing of events and activities of interest to us as photographers. All these things were – individually – relatively small but together strengthened the club and moved it forward, always to the benefit of the members.

Daniel attended EVERY club function – picnics, meet-ups, meetings, service projects. One unheralded thing that Daniel did was to incorporate into his photography the subject matter of the previous month's program. If the program was about photographing soap bubbles Daniel immersed himself in learning how to photograph soap bubbles...and then sharing that experience with the members.

The last good thing Daniel did was to convince Laura Jenkins to become the club's new president.

Daniel has been slowed down recently due to complications from surgery but he's on the mend. Thank you, Daniel, for your service to Foothills Photography Group.
