Feature Article – iPhone Photography; Not by Choice -- Janice Koskey—

Editor's note: I got to know Janice when I published her articles in the PSA Travel Division's newsletter. She presented to our club in April of 2021.

Necessity is the mother of invention, or in this case reinvention. If you have felt defeated by a limitation of any kind you may relate to this photo story. Last year on a visit to my sister's house in Delray Beach, Florida to photograph my usual wildlife at the beautiful wetlands there, I was in a car accident and shattered my right humerus, leaving my photography arm useless and my ability to drive a car temporarily suspended.



After surgery I had to spend many long days lying down. Since photography is my go-to stress reliever and creative outlet, I began using my left hand to photograph cloud formations in the sky outside the window. Too weak to hold let alone snap the shutter on my Nikon, my iPhone had to suffice. Soon able to venture out, at first a few yards, then to the mailboxes, and eventually further around the complex, I found I could manage to photograph occasional birds near the small pond, sunset over the canal, a spray of flora, a stray feather, or a shell.



Using my non-dominant hand made most photos less than tack sharp, so with countless hours on my hands, I decided to explore some creative applications I'd heard about but never used. A favorite and most versatile app is Snapseed where I could use the sharpen scenes or heal extraneous elements from roughly composed photos. The most

exciting discovery I made during this transformation of my photo style was double exposure. In Snapseed it is easy. Now I realize I can make image overlays incamera with my Nikon, but at the time this app was a lifesaver. With it I was able to utilize those cloudy skies, reflections, isolated ground finds and blurred bird sightings and combine them to create interesting visual effects.

Those of you who witnessed my presentation on *Contemplating our Photography: Looking behind the Images* won't be surprised that I was also able to spend those lonely recuperative hours looking deeply into the images I'd made and to gain insight into lessons learned during this life-changing event. Always the caregiver, I was now being cared for; always the healthy and active one, I was now handicapped and secluded. The shrouded aspects of my composite photos reflected my new limited view; my unlikely combinations of objects whispered of resourcefulness, changing values, and gratitude. Looking closely at what was before my eyes all along slowed me down considerably and allowed me to see that we don't need to travel far to find beauty or use a fancy camera to

make images with meaning and merit.

I hope you enjoy some of the fruits of the temporary misfortune which forced me to look at life through a different lens, changed my perspective, and helped me reinvent my photography.
