

Tell us a little bit about yourself. I live in Clarkesville with my three dogs, Cooper, Bailey (aka Hot Shot) and Sydney. I also have three cats running around the house, Noah, Gracie and Duke. I care for my mother who has dementia. I currently work at North Georgia Tech but am looking forward to retiring soon. I am the Department Chair of General Education, and I also teach math.

When did your interest in photography begin? I think I've always had a camera. I remember my mother having a Polaroid. I started using a DSLR around 2009.

What camera do you use? What is your favorite lens? Canon R5 Canon 70-200 or 100-500

What do you like to shoot (e.g., landscapes, portraits, pets, wildlife, babies, weddings, etc.)? Landscapes and wildlife mainly. I also do some sports photography.

Where is your favorite place you've been to take photographs? Yellowstone & Grand Tetons



What is your dream destination to photograph? Australia or Africa and I'm heading to Alaska in August

Who or what inspires your interest in photography? I like to capture memories.

What is your favorite photo you've taken? I don't really have a favorite. Here are a few recent ones that I like because they show joy. (See photos on these pages..)

What is your favorite all-time photo by another photographer? I can't really say I have a favorite. I admire the photographers that capture iconic moments in history such as Iwo Jima.



What advice would you have for someone who wants to become a photographer? Practice, practice, practice....experiment with your camera and you'll start to understand what makes a good photograph and you'll develop a style. And photograph what you love. Don't get caught up in the technicalities. A photograph can have great meaning to you but not technically be a great photo to someone else.

Ten or eleven years ago I watched as he was stumbling into the world of bird photography – trying new backyard setups, building new landing spaces, building new blinds, always experimenting. Today he has perfected practices and techniques that produce the absolute best, sharpest, and most evocative bird portraits you will see anywhere.

How good is he? This lizard was chosen as shot-of-the day in National Geographic out of 8,000 entries and the dragon fly was chosen as best-in-show at Gibbs Gardens out of 800 entries.

Since Will's retirement after the 2014 workshop, I have been asked to lead the Fall workshops at Tremont. For several years, I taught Spring workshops

with Lori Kincaid in the Max Patch area of the Appalachians. I've also co-led NANPA Regional Events in the Everglades (in 2012) and the Smokies (in 2015)."


