

Hemlock Falls Creek - June 20. FIELD TRIP PHOTOS

The Hemlock Falls Creek field trip was...

...absolutely awesome! The weather was cool, the sky was overcast (perfect for pictures of moving water) and the company was excellent.

Right here is where I tell you that we are going back to Hemlock Falls Creek when the leaves are at their peak - tentatively August 17. Mark your calendar!

Probably the most rewarding thing to come from this field trip was that we learned from each other. Several of us had some experience with moving water while others were wrestling with how to slow down the shutter speed on their particular camera. The mix was great - and everyone got some great pictures.

SIGs are simply a group of people with a common interest. There usually isn't a whole lot of organization. They may meet to discuss their work or they may travel together to make photos. Just for Beginners!

Horizontal vs. Vertical Format

Each photographer makes a conscious decision to capture an image in a horizontal or vertical format. That decision is often based on commonly followed rules. Other factors should influence the decision.

It is often said that a vertical subject is best photographed in a vertical format. Examples are a tree, tall building, or a standing individual person. This common idea is probably based on filling up the frame with the main subject. The main subject in horizontal pictures is often a wide subject, such as an ocean scene with waves, a field of cows, or a group of three people standing side by side.

These format choices seem natural but can result in ordinary images. The beginning photographer is encouraged to frame the subject both horizontally and vertically before taking the picture. This promotes creativity.

Also, this motivates the photographer to study the composition. Some basic elements of composition include secondary subjects, distracting elements, and subject placement. Analyzing the image in both horizontal and vertical views is a wise learning experience.

The use for the photographic image is another factor in choosing a horizontal or vertical format. If the image is used for an advertisement, there must be free space for the advertising text. The same principle applies to greeting cards. If the goal is stock photography, it is common to submit both formats for the same subject.

Exciting images result from unusual, unexpected compositions. Static images can easily result when following the commonly accepted choice of format. Nevertheless, it is important for a beginning photographer to master the traditional formats.

Botanical Garden Field Trip Saturday, July 18

We will meet at 8:00 AM in the Cornelia Walmart parking lot at the SW corner directly across from Captain D's. We will depart at 8:15 sharp! Please give your carpool driver \$3-\$5 for the round trip. Admission is \$8 for individuals or \$7 for groups of 10 or more.

Directions: South on GA 365/US 23. Right onto Jessie Jewell Pkwy (exit #24). Right onto US 129/Limestone Pkwy then Left onto Sweetbay Drive. (The entrance to the garden) Driving time 25-30 minutes, distance approximately 27 miles.

There are two ½ mile trails in the gardens; nice if you want a walk in those wooded areas. The planted areas cover about two acres now and will be expanded in the years to come.

Recommended kit: Minimum – Camera w/ wide angle lens (short focal distance). A close-up or macro lens is much better.

What you really want: The above w/ a tripod that allows low level shooting, i.e. 1'-3' height. Extension rings (tubes) or bellows for your lens. A brimmed hat to shade your viewfinder - and you. Something for your knees if *kneeded*. A spritz bottle of water, if you want to embellish your flowers with 'rain drops'. I checked; it's okay. A black cloth to isolate a specimen or to shade it.

Barbara Johns, John Martin and I will be available to help you - or learn from you. The gardens open at 9:00 AM. Two hours seems about right for the shoot. So let's meet back at the ticket counter and count heads before leaving at 11:00. If the majority wants more time, we can all remain or split up. This will be a large group so make sure you are accounted for. Lunch at Captain D's upon return to Cornelia.
