

Things are not always what they seem! At our last meeting I agreed to write something about an assignment I had just received and its outcome. I was told I was going to Lanai, Hawaii to photograph an event. I agreed to go because I had never been to the island of Lanai and I wanted to see what it was like. I had been to all of the other Hawaiian Islands, and they were very lush and beautiful. I was supposed to photograph the week's activities for a pharmaceutical company. It was an

award recognition event for their top 2 make couples photos, a dolphin watch, some SNUBA diving, a 4-wheel jeep excursion in the back country, and a paddle board activity in the surf.

I bought a NIKON AW1 so I could do some underwater photography and was looking forward to the week. I had an idea of what it would be like, and was pumped to go. After a twelve-hour airplane ride, we arrived and took the shuttle to the Four Seasons Resort. They were beautiful accommodations and I prepared for the shoots. Best laid plans... as they say.

Long story short, the sea was extremely rough that week and there were no dolphins to be found. SNUBA got cancelled, the people paddled out once past the breakwater and then quickly returned to go hang around the pool. Recent rains had washed out all of the jeep trails through former

The moral of the story is that you can plan your assignment to great lengths, get equipment ready, and visualize your shots, but be prepared to punt and make the most of what is available!





## Tip of the Month Provided by FPG Member Rick Moorhead

- Don't let the weather stop you from capturing an attractive landscape. Rain can add a degree of softness and peacefulness to a scene. On an overcast day, be sure your scene has an area of color in it to counteract the overall dull lighting.
- Keep the rules of composition in mind when framing a scene. <u>Lines</u>, in particular, can be a strong factor in making an interesting landscape. An awareness of and the judicious placement of <u>planes</u> in the scene can also be factors in improving your composition.

- Landscape photography is often more horizontal than it is vertical, presenting the opportunity to shoot a <u>panorama</u>. If you are faced with a wide vista and your camera has a panorama mode, this is the time to select it. <u>Cropping afterwards</u> can achieve a similar purpose.
- When the wind is blowing or water is moving waves, waterfalls, a tumbling brook capturing that movement by using a slow shutter speed to create blur can add great interest to a landscape. When selecting a slow shutter speed, be sure you retain proper exposure by also appropriately adjusting your camera's <u>aperture</u>. Many cameras will do this automatically for you in *Shutter Priority* mode.
